Whether you're traveling short or long distances, you may have a more relaxing journey if you prepare in advance for your pets. If traveling by car, map out some dog-friendly rest stops beforehand. These may include dog parks, outdoor shopping centers, and open fields. Then you'll have a better idea of where you and your dogs can safely stop to stretch your legs. A few walks during the trip may help your dog remain calm and on good behavior for the ride.

A checklist will remind you of all the odds and ends your dog may need. Items to include are a collar and leash, food, fresh water, toys, bedding, a kennel, and any medications they may need.

Other forms of travel require additional measures, so be sure to check with the travel company about pet restrictions ahead of time. Airlines typically require recent documentation from a veterinarian. But even if you aren't traveling by air, it doesn't hurt to schedule them a wellness check-up before leaving. This ensures their vaccinations are up-to-date and that they're in good health for the planned activities.

For camping, it's good to follow the "better safe than sorry" rule of thumb as you're packing for the trip. An emergency kit can make the difference between a lovely time and a stressful misadventure. The bare essentials for a kit include tweezers, bandages, styptic powder, saline solution, and an antihistamine. A quick review of canine first aid procedures can also better prepare you for an emergency.

If your dog doesn't already have a microchip or ID tag on their collar, put that on the to-do list as well. There's nothing like the wilderness or unfamiliar territory when it comes to piquing a dog's curiosity! Even if they don't tend to roam when excited, there's a possibility something could startle them into running off. With a microchip or ID tag, there's a much better chance of having your dog returned to you safely.

Last but not least, you may benefit from scheduling their grooming appointments for immediately before and/or after the journey. Traveling with dogs is much nicer when they're clean—and camping can certainly make a mess of their coats. 

### **When Large Dogs Pull on the Leash**

If big dogs become excited and try to dart after something when out walking, one of two things usually happens: the dogs end up choking themselves on their collars, or they take their owners for a walk rather than having their owners walk them. To stop this from happening, you can try using a collar or harness specially designed for this.

The Halti is one such collar. It wraps around the dog's face and prompts the dog to turn sideways whenever they attempt to lunge forward. Therefore, it discourages them from yanking on the leash. The Halti does not restrict their mouths; it simply puts the owner in more control. There are also harnesses that humanely discourage pulling. These wrap around the chest and attach to an ordinary collar.

### **You Know You're a Dog Person When...**

- ...you don't think it's odd to stand in the yard late at night or in the pouring rain repeating, "Go pee!" over and over, though your dog's paying no attention to you.

### **Is Your Dog Overweight?**

Because obesity can lead to discomfort and health problems in dogs, it's important that we monitor their weight—and do what we can to control it if needed. Monitoring is especially important for older dogs and certain breeds that are prone to obesity.

It's actually quite simple to determine if dogs are heavier than ideal for their breed and build. The basic rule of thumb is you ought to be able to feel their backbone, and when pressing gently on their sides, you ought to be able to feel their ribs. When looking at them from the side, there should also be a discernable waist between their hipbones and the lower portion of their rib cage.

If they look rather rounded and feel squishy on all sides, then they are at risk of developing heart disease, diabetes, and joint problems, among other conditions. Fortunately, there are things you can do to get them back in shape and in better health.

Smaller portions of a higher-quality food can effectively reduce their weight. Due to the possibility of the suggested serving size being too much for your dog, you may want to ask your veterinarian for personalized feeding guidelines. It's also helpful to cut back on the number of treats they get. No need to feel bad for doing this—you could be saving their life!

While decreasing the number of calories they consume, increase the amount of physical activity they get. Even an extra 10 minutes of walking each day can help them slim down. Depending on the severity of their obesity, you may need to gradually increase the amount of exercise they get. Otherwise, a sudden shift in activity level could put too much strain on their heart and limbs.

### **Battling Doggie Boredom**

When people get home after leaving their dog alone, they're usually greeted with lots of excitement—and sometimes with a huge mess. "What on Earth have you gotten into now?" they say. Some people believe their dogs tear into things from spite over being left alone, but it's more likely they were suffering from boredom.

A few things have proven helpful for this problem. By walking them before you leave, they'll have less energy and desire for playing when you're away. Food puzzle toys, such as a Kong ball, can occupy and entertain them once their energy returns. For soothing anxiety, you can also try electric diffusers that calm dogs with the scent of pheromones. And, of course, you'll want to be sure to get back to them as soon as possible!

## 5 Tips for Clean, Healthy Eyes

A common complaint among dog owners is the look of their dogs' eyes. Oftentimes, dogs have a discharge that stains the hair on their faces.

1. Because there are many causes of this—from allergies to breed-specific abnormalities—a veterinarian should check it out to see if the dog is in need of medical treatment.
2. Keep the hair around the eyes clipped short or pulled back in long-haired breeds. Not only can these hairs scratch their corneas, they can soak up moisture from the eyes. This causes matting that irritates their skin and becomes discolored.
3. Prior to taking dogs for a swim or giving them a bath, put a canine ophthalmic solution in their eyes. This protects their eyes from irritants in the water.
4. Wipe discharge from their hair with a soft, damp cloth as needed, and gently rub any excess moisture from the hair with a dry cloth. This stops it from building up and matting.
5. Use a canine-approved cleanser for removing discoloration. In severe cases, a daily treatment can help keep stains at bay between their regularly scheduled grooming appointments. Just be sure to follow the label's instructions!

## A Day in the Life of a Matted Dog

The problems for a matted dog go far beyond the fact that their coat isn't looking as nice as it could. In fact, they probably couldn't care less about the way it looks. All they know is the way it *feels*.

If you take a moment to pull the hairs on your arm, you can get an idea of what a dog's skin feels like when their fur is matted together. Only the dog feels it day and night because the mats are constantly pulling. This can limit their range of motion in severe cases. But even small mats can further irritate them. The skin beneath a mat may have debris trapped on it and it gets no fresh air.

As if that weren't distressing enough for the dog, they can also receive less love and attention because of it. Most people don't like the feel of a rough and clumpy coat, and so they stop petting dogs that have one, or they pet *around* the matted area. The dog then loses stimulation that normally helps keep them healthy and in good spirits.

For these reasons, it really is important that mats be removed as soon as possible. With daily brushing and routine grooming, the problem can also be avoided altogether. If you have any questions about managing mats, please do let us know! We'll be happy to help you care for them.
